**PROCEEDINGS: (IN CHAMBERS) ORDER CONTINUING CLAIM  
CONSTRUCTION HEARING**

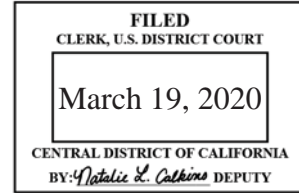
The Court issues this ORDER in response to the unforeseeable global pandemic involving disease coronavirus 2019 (“COVID-19”), caused by the virus SARS-CoV-2 (“the virus”).

On January 31, 2020, the United States Department of Health and Human Services declared a public health emergency pursuant to the Public Health Service Act. See 42 U.S.C. § 247d. On March 13, 2020, the President declared a national emergency. Beginning in January 2020, the World Health Organization (“WHO”) and the United States Centers for Disease Control (“CDC”) issued guidance on measures designed to lessen the spread of the disease and the impact of the virus. (See <https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/cases-updates/summary.html>.) The CDC advises avoiding being exposed to the virus, which is believed to spread mainly through person-to-person contact.

On March 16, 2020, the White House Coronavirus Task Force issued guidelines to slow the spread of the virus. (See <https://www.whitehouse.gov/articles/15-days-slow-spread/>.) These guidelines include following the directions of state and local authorities. (*Id.*) On March 19, 2020, and subject to exceptions not relevant here, the California State Public Health Officer and Director of the California Department of Public Health ordered that all persons living in the State of California stay home or at their place of residence except as needed for essential needs. (See <https://covid19.ca.gov/stayhome-except-for-essential-needs/>.)

Therefore, in light of issues relating to potential in-custody exposure to COVID-19 and to protect from possible spread of the virus, the Claim Construction hearing is continued to **June 9, 2020 at 9:00 a.m.**

12 CORONAVIRUS PUBLIC  
13 EMERGENCY

14 ACTIVATION OF CONTINUITY OF  
15 OPERATIONS PLAN

16 WHEREAS, the President of the United States has declared a national  
17 emergency in response to the outbreak of COVID-19, also known as the  
18 “Coronavirus;”

19 WHEREAS, the Governor of the State of California has declared a state of  
20 emergency in response to the outbreak of COVID-19;

21 WHEREAS, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has recommended  
22 that throughout the United States, for at least eight weeks, all gatherings should be  
23 limited to no more than 10 people;

24 WHEREAS, local public health departments have recommended that large  
25 gatherings be avoided, that elderly and other vulnerable populations avoid person-to-  
26 person contact, and that employers allow employees to telework to the extent practical;

1 WHEREAS, to date, several hundred people within the Central District of  
2 California have been confirmed to be infected with COVID-19 and the number of  
3 those infected continues to rise, causing an emergency pandemic;

4 WHEREAS, the Court has issued General Order Nos. 20-02 and 20-03  
5 regarding the Coronavirus public emergency, implementing temporary emergency  
6 procedures;

7 WHEREAS, since the Court took action to implement those emergency  
8 procedures, COVID-19 has continued to spread among the population of the Central  
9 District of California;

10 With the consent of the Executive Committee, the Chief Judge orders as  
11 follows:

12 The Continuity of Operations (“COOP”) Plan for the Central District of  
13 California is hereby activated, effective March 23, 2020 through and including May 1,  
14 2020. The COOP Plan may be extended or inactivated as necessary.

15 The activation of the COOP Plan is necessary to ensure the continuous  
16 performance of essential functions and operations of the Court.

17 The following are examples of actions that will be taken pursuant to the COOP  
18 Plan:


- 19 • All of the Courthouses of the Central District of California will be closed  
20 to the public except for hearings on criminal duty matters, as discussed  
21 below.
- 22 • In civil cases, no hearings will go forward except for emergency time-  
23 sensitive matters, such as requests for temporary restraining orders and  
24 preliminary injunctions, as ordered by the assigned judicial officer. Any  
25 hearings on emergency civil matters will proceed telephonically only. Pro

1            se litigants must mail their filings to the Clerk of Court at 255 E. Temple  
2 Street, Suite TS-134, Los Angeles, CA 90012-3332.

- 3            • In criminal cases, criminal duty matters will go forward in the Edward R.  
4 Roybal Building and United States Courthouse in Los Angeles only. All  
5 criminal document duty will be handled by each division in the normal  
6 course of business. Telephonic hearings on other criminal matters may  
7 proceed as directed by the assigned judicial officer.
- 8            • All matters before the Bankruptcy Court will proceed telephonically.  
9 Further guidance will be provided by the Bankruptcy Court to pro se  
10 petitioners.
- 11            • Chambers staff will be directed to telework except as otherwise directed  
12 by their assigned judicial officer. The Clerk of Court will implement a  
13 telework policy for the staff of the Clerk’s Office and the Probation and  
14 Pretrial Services Office at her discretion.
